Welcome to Global Issues

CLASS OVERVIEW

This is a **social studies elective** for the student who **desires an opportunity to explore current world affairs in greater depth.** If you are interested in history and current global issues, this is the right place for you! This course examines the changing issues that affect our world, nation, and communities. Because the issues in the world are always changing, the course content also changes from year to year. Students will help determine the topics we will focus on. Points of discussion will include the global community, war and conflict, climate and energy, global technology and innovation, and protest and change. Students will be required to keep informed of current affairs; curiosity is crucial! This is a project based course, and as such, students will create and present a series of projects.

Key Learning Strategies

- Read and annotate informational text
- Participate in small group and whole class discussions and debates
- Focus on argumentative and informative speaking and writing
- Support arguments with evidence
- Practice the process of inquiry
- Create and present information appropriate to task, purpose, and audience

As stated above, this class is project-based, focusing on the creation and presentation of **self-selected** Global Issues topics. We will build speaking and listening skills, a critical skill for students who are interested in taking on **leadership** roles in life.

We will also read **one biographical novel** this trimester related to global issues.

<u>CLASS RULES</u> So that you can learn and I can teach, I have a set of rules to ensure we have an orderly and successful classroom.

- 1. BE POLITE AND RESPECTFUL. Treat each person in this room with dignity and be polite. Respect the classroom; no gum, food, or hats/hoods. When you disagree, disagree respectfully at an appropriate time.
- 2. BE READY TO WORK HARD. Come to class on time and prepared. Bring appropriate materials. Complete assignments and homework on time. Take responsibility for your learning by getting the help you need when you need it. I am here to help you succeed. ADVOCATE FOR YOURSELF~
- 3. FOLLOW DIRECTIONS THE FIRST TIME THEY ARE GIVEN. Listen to directions. Be engaged. And always keep your head up.

Consequences for choosing to not follow rules:

Warning After school

Failure to show up at scheduled time after school brings you to step 4.

Important rules to consider:

- Almost all of the coursework will be accessible digitally. It is expected that you will bring your charged laptop to class each day. We will use it daily.
- Phone use: No phones, no earbuds. Pouch your phone when you enter the classroom: your pouched phone will be used for attendance. Communicate with me if you need it for an emergency
- For each unexcused tardy expect to have 3 points deducted from your timeliness grade: check power school if you're wondering how it is affecting your grade. I will not remind you. Be to class on time.

CLASS PROCEDURES

Procedures are important for creating an effective and successful learning environment.

Start of class and end of class: We will often begin with a CNN 10 or audio warm up, focusing on the day's news, followed by the agenda and a warm up. You have the last 3 minutes of class to clean your desks.

Homework/assignments: need to be done at the beginning of class to be considered on time.

Late work: You begin with a bank of points called "Timeliness" (30 points) for the trimester. For each assignment turned in late, 3 points will be taken from this total. (And remember, unexcused tardies= -3 points.)

Absences: You have the amount of days you were absent to turn in assignments for full credit. ** You are responsible for requesting the missed work from me before or after school.

Missing work due to absences or traveling will be a zero until made up. You will be given credit for the assignment when it is turned in.
