- 1) Influenza

- 2) Covid

Parent: Asked Mr. Friske to comment on theft in the dorms.

Andrew Friske: Theft is talked about at orientation. Students are provided with free locks which they can use to lock their closet and drawers. Please encourage students to label their clothing. Staff have noticed that laundry goes missing, especially if it is left in the laundry room for extensive periods of time. (Staff will bag abandoned clothes for a period of time if it is left in a machine. Students can ask their RA if they are missing something.) If a theft is reported, it is investigated, but without good information it is hard to locate missing items while respecting the space of all braves. If students are caught stealing there are serious repercussions.
